In this story Prisoner B-3087, Yanek has faced many soldiers, were they bruised him, but he never gave up. He held back tears, and fought back. Yanek during the camps he barely ate, Yanek had several long death marches, were they were weak to barely keep up, but Yanek kept going, and on his way to one of the camps a boy was very weak to walk, In one point of the book "He wasn't really heavy-none of us were anymore- but I was already so weak and tired from the march and from eating bread sparingly that I barely had the strength to carry myself. Within just few meters I stumbled the weight of just him but I didn't let go (Gratz, 2013, pg. 175)". This quote explains how Yanek was very tough to keep up the pace, trying hard not to fall or he'll get killed. And even though he wasn't supposed show care, he did what was right, so therefore you do something good, good is coming your way.

To sum up, Anne Lamott's quote summarized that Yanek stayed strong throughout the whole process of ten concentration camps, and he never gave up.
